1 Introduction

Beaumont is a prosperous community that is attractive and offers an excellent quality of life to all of its citizens. The 2016 federal census ranked Beaumont as the fastest growing community in the Edmonton Metropolitan Region and fifth fastest growing municipality in Canada between 2011 and 2016 in the metropolitan areas census.

Due to this incredible growth and through our strong elected leadership, Beaumont is uniquely positioned to build a well-connected, dynamic, and engaged community with a stable and diverse economic base.

Our Beaumont: Municipal Strategic Plan (**Our Beaumont**) builds upon the successes of the past, addresses our community's present needs, while setting out a path to achieve Council's and the Community's collective vision for the future. The purpose of Our Beaumont is to provide the foundational direction for our municipality's strategic work, to guide us in our everyday operations, and to prioritize budget and resource allocations.

In the fall of 2017, Beaumont's newly elected Council began a strategic planning process to build upon the vision for Beaumont in 2044, to identify values, principles, and priority goals to focus on over the next four years.

Through Our Beaumont, Council is taking a new approach to strategic planning than our community has not seen in the past.

A new strategic plan will be developed every four years, in alignment with the election cycle. Regular Administrative Council Reports

Annual Reporting

Once the Directional Plans become a part of *Our Beaumont*, annual reporting will be both qualitative and quantitative.

6 Plan Review

Our Beaumont provides high-level strategic direction. As the Directional Plans are completed and incorporated into Our Beaumont, the Strategic Pillars of Change may be updated. An annual check-ins will also occur, with Council's receipt of the Our Beaumont Annual Report. A comprehensive review of the plan will occur every four years, ideally within the first year of Council's new term.
